In this month's article I thought I would review what the Okanogan Valley Chapter members have accomplished in the past decade and what the public lands trail systems would look like if we were not dedicated to keeping trails open for recreational purposes. **It's a big pat on the back to us.**

Early in the decade we were a small Chapter with a few energetic members like **Ernie and Lavina Fields, Jim Pruitt, Francis and Denny Gregory, Frank and Linda Osborne, Tryugve and Janet Culp**, just to name a few. They were cleaning trails in the National Forest and keeping the mission statement alive.

The Chapter has grown in the last 10 years and so have our obligations in keeping trails open and developing new trailheads and trails for the public and stock users to enjoy.

The list of accomplishments are impressive.

Food for Thought, What would our trail systems look like today if it wasn't for our hard working members?

Would the following trailheads be available and would the associated trails be open?

1. **The Bonaparte Trail System**—Maybe, but not in the condition as it exists today, including extensive trun pikes over some consistently wet areas.
  2. **4th of July Trailhead**— No. It started out as a wide spot utilized by woodcutters, now we have developed it into a 1st class trailhead with campsites, picnic tables, fire rings, hitch rails, high lines, toilet facility, informational signage, and loading ramp.
  3. **Bannon Mtn. Trail System**— No, It was originally was just a place for loading and unloading cattle. Now it is a useable camping area with toilet facilities, camp sites, picnic tables, fire rings, hitch rails, high lines, loading ramp and convenient stock water. We cleaned many miles of trails, installed trail number sign at the trailhead.
  4. **Sinlahekin Trail System**— Maybe, It was developed in just 2 years from an impassible existing trail and canal from the headquarters to Blue Lake. With just our continued usage and unofficial maintenance a trail is being developed from Blue Lake down to Hunter's Camp.
  5. **Disappointment Trail System**— Maybe, The trails have been improved by the Snowmobilers and our members in the last 2 years by installing turnpikes and general annual maintenance.
  6. **Whistler Canyon Trailhead**— Yes and No. Access was over private property and this courtesy was withdrawn in 2008, because our Chapter volunteered to take the lead in developing the new trailhead and began working with the Forest Service and the County, a trailhead available to the public will be completed in a timely manner.
  7. **Barnell/Bailey Trail System**—No, due to our dedicated members, we will develop this into another trail system for all to enjoy. Some work has done and more is scheduled for this year.
  8. **Wilcox Driveway Trailhead**— Available now but only for parking with toilet facilities. This year we will provide materials and volunteer labor to develop it into a first class trailhead with hitch rails, high lines, and a swinging gate. We are proud to know our work will be part of the PNW Scenic Trail System from Wilcox down to the new Whistler Canyon Trailhead on Highway 97
  9. We did all this along with clearing many miles of trails, building turnpikes and installing bridges throughout Okanogan County. If it wasn't for Okanogan Valley Chapter members, where would we riding today? Give it some thought and when the call goes out for help on some of these projects, consider being a part of something that is a "whole lot bigger" than just you and me. DAVE.

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**TRAIL BOSS REPORT  
JANUARY/FEBRUARY  
2010**

Here it is the 19<sup>th</sup> of January and it feels like March with all the warm weather and rain we've had the last few weeks. My corral is such a quagmire that I'm having to feed my horses in the pasture which is also getting wet and muddy in places.

Fortunately, I'm a 4 season recreationist and the snow has been decent for snowmobiling this year. As of January 17<sup>th</sup> there was over three feet of snow on Starvation Mt. and in Beaver Meadow with a little over two feet at Salmon Meadow. This is still below average for this time of year, but we could still get some good snow storms in February and March at the higher elevations.

We don't have any work parties scheduled until March. However, we have been doing some reconnaissance and layout of trailheads at Carter Mt. on Highway 97 near Crumbacher and at Horse Spring Coulee located a few miles west of Tonasket. These trailheads are located on Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife land and we are in the process of applying for a grant for purchase of equipment and material for development of the trailheads. If we are successful in getting the grant, the trailheads will increase our early spring front country riding opportunities.

Be sure to check the 2010 Year Book for upcoming events and activities. Check out the "Trail Clearing Tips" on page 18 of the 2010 Yearbook if you plan to participate in trail clearing work parties this year. Remember, if you are using a chainsaw, you must have a current certification. Chainsaw certification is scheduled for 6 March at the Tonasket Ranger District this year.

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
